
Fake ID by Lamar Giles *


Find Me by Romily Bernard *


The Body in the Woods by April Henry *


Counterfeit Son by Elaine Marie Alphin *


Acceleration by Graham McNamee *

Soon, Mickey learns about a conspiracy so shocking that it makes high school drama seem like a luxury – and leaves him questioning everything about the life he thought he knew.




Escape Theory by Margaux Froley *


The Body Finder by Kimberly Derting *


Liars, Inc by Paula Stokes *




Thirteen Days to Midnight by Patrick Carman * +


The Assault by Brian Falkner *


Nemesis by Brandon Reichs *+




The Testing by Joelle Charbonneau *


Made for You by Melissa Marr*


Anna Dressed in Blood by Kendare Blake *


Don't Turn Around by Michelle Gagnon *


Rikers High by Paul Valponi *


Twelve Fingered Boy by John Hornor Jacobs *


Soldier Boys by Dean Hughes *


Sunrise over Fallujah by Walter Dean Myers


There You'll Find Me by Jenny B. Jones *


Caleb and Kate by Cindy Martinusen Coloma *


What Light by Jay Asher *


Steelheart by Brandon Sanderson *


Bonechiller by Graham McNamee *


Wake by Lisa McMann *




Cinder by Marissa Meyer


Crackback by John Coy


The Crossover by Kwame Alexander *


This Way Home by Wes Moore *


Hooper by Geoff Herbach *


Stupid Fast by Geoff Herbach *


Game Change by Joseph Monninger

Call Me by My Name by John E. Bradley




but it may be his only way out.



Shattering Glass by Gail Giles





Love You, Hate You, Miss You by Elizabeth Scott *



Hate List by Jennifer Brown *



with her life.




The Pregnancy Project by Gaby Rodriguez (NONFICITON)


The Bite of the Mango by Mariatu Kamara


Tweak: Growing up on Methamphetamines by Nic Sheff


Boy Meets Boy by David Levithan
